

Conversion to Allegheny County 911 Dispatch Moved Up to December 13

The transition to the Allegheny County 911 dispatch system has been moved from January 1 to December 13.

According to Borough Manager Kurt Ferguson, this is a positive development. "In working with the county, it was determined that since we're basically ready right now, it would be advantageous for us to switch early so that any bugs can be dealt with." Ferguson went on to say that since many other boroughs are switching to county dispatching services on January 1, this move will give Edgewood almost three weeks of exclusive work with the county. "We believe that it is important to have their undivided attention for something as important as this," Ferguson said.

Beginning on December 13, calls placed to the old police dispatch number will be automatically forwarded to the county 911 center. This forwarding service will be in place for approximately six months. The non-emergency number, (412) 242-9994, will remain active for calling in overnight parking and other non-emergency purposes.

The front desk will be staffed 24 hours a day through December 31. Starting January 1, the desk will be staffed Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. – 12 midnight. A voice-mail system will be in place to receive non-emergency calls at night and on weekends. Other messages with lesser urgency can be sent through e-mail on the borough website or through the borough office voice mail system.

To accommodate residents during the unstaffed hours, a drop box for parking ticket payments will be installed, and a phone will be placed at the borough building entrance for residents needing to speak to a police officer. The phone will automatically connect to the county dispatchers, and they will have an officer return to the borough building to

Fire Company Seeking Heroic Volunteers

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles by firefighter Steve Krumholz that will appear over the next issues of the newsletter as space allows.)

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy in his inaugural address called upon Americans to give back to their country and communities when he beseeched us to "Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country." President Kennedy's plea for us to give something back to our country is as important today as it was 45 years ago. Over the years we've seen many changes in America, with Americans becoming much more security and safety conscious since the events of September, 2001. In the past four years we have seen a fundamental transformation of American society from being free and open to one where we must be cautious and concerned about what happens in our neighborhoods and communities.

Most of us should be able to recall the photographic images from September 11, 2001. Many of the most lasting images are the photographs of firefighters going into the World Trade Towers as the workers inside fled to safety; of the firefighters picking through the ruins searching for survivors; or of the firefighters raising the American flag among the smoking, jumbled mass of these once proud symbols of American prosperity. It appears from these images, that firefighters were America's heroes during that fateful time four years ago. Although New York's firefighter heroes are paid firefighters, volunteer firefighters are just as important in helping a community, and they become everyday heroes when they are called upon to serve.

According to the group Independent Sector, "about 44% of American adults volunteer on a regular basis." However, about half of those who volunteer will *Continued on page 9* meet with the resident. "From a practical standpoint, this will work the way it always has," said Ferguson. "The buzzer is just replaced by a telephone."

Ferguson stressed that neither he, the police, nor the fire department anticipate any change in the emergency services that residents will receive. "We will respond as quickly and efficiently as ever," he said.

"Two of our own part-time dispatchers are full-time dispatchers with the county, and they will be assigned to Edgewood to help through the transition.

The primary difference, according to Ferguson, will be for those calls that fall between emergencies and routine weekday business. Borough residents are used to having a live voice at the borough office 24 hours a day, and that will no longer be true.

Chief of Police Paul Wood and his senior sergeants visited the county dispatch center and were very impressed with the professionalism of the center and the people running it, Ferguson reports. In addition, the fire department has worked diligently on planning an on-call system of volunteers to drive the truck during the hours that the Edgewood desk is unstaffed. The Edgewood dispatchers have driven the fire trucks to the scene of the fire, and will continue to do that during the weekday hours. Cooperation with other local fire companies will continue as usual, but in what Ferguson calls "a more formal, focused process." He credited the fire company's work in this area as one element that is making the transition possible.

Ferguson urges residents to check the borough website regularly for any updated information on this transition. He stresses, "It is my overwhelming belief that this town will not suffer any reduction in service," and asks for patience with any minor inconveniences experienced in non-emergency situations.

Police Statistics

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 677 calls for service in October 2005. There were 197 complaints received and nine accidents investigated, of which three resulted in personal injury.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 33 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, three were burglary, 17 were shoplifting and 11 were other crimes.

There were seven adult arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations. No juveniles were arrested for these violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 79 traffic citations, 237 parking citations and made one arrest for driving under the influence. There were seven vandalism or criminal mischief complaints and three narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 16 false alarm calls, took 369 reports, responded to 15 public nuisance complaints, wrote two non-traffic citations and responded to 20 calls for medical assistance.

do so only if asked. The formal volunteer workforce represented the equivalent of over nine million full-time employees at an estimated value of \$239 billion. One might ask, "How can we help our neighborhoods and communities?" For several months after September, 2001, appreciation for the Edgewood Fire Department increased, but then we turned our interests elsewhere, and support for the department fell off significantly.

In some cases apathy has set in and the respect has waned. This can be measured by the increasing number of drivers who do not have the courtesy to move out of the way when fire trucks are on an emergency call with lights and siren activated. This can pose a very dangerous situation and slow the emergency vehicles down in responding to the call. Fewer Edgewood residents are stepping forward to help provide the measure of security necessary for the lives of their families and the protection of their property that comes with having well trained and adequate firefighters available at all times of the day.

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Fortunately, the bylaws of the Edgewood Fire Department provide that members can live within five miles of the borough; otherwise the number of volunteer firefighters would number about half of its current members. Many people say they would do anything for their children, parents or other family members. If that is a true statement, we should see more volunteers at the fire department.

In 1986, President Reagan stated after the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster, "The future doesn't belong to the fainthearted; it belongs to the brave." In the Borough of Edgewood, there are currently 11 fully-trained firefighters, and three probationary firefighters. All are men; however, the Edgewood Fire Department is not a "good old boys" club, it's just that no women have ever followed through to receive training to be a Class 1 firefighter. There are women volunteer firefighters in virtually all neighboring communities, but not in Edgewood. There are no specific physical or age limitations or requirements to join the Edgewood Fire Department,



although if someone has a known physical limitation they may be asked to see their physician for a recommendation on whether they can be a Class One or Class Two firefighter.

Edgewood firefighters respond to all fire calls within the Borough and provide mutual aid to neighboring fire departments. It is important to our community that we provide assistance to our neighbors in Braddock, Braddock Hills, Swissvale, Rankin, Forest Hills, and other neighboring communities because they are here for us when we receive a call within the borough. Sometimes during the day, only one Edgewood firefighter may be available to respond to calls.
