

Edgewood Community Day Featured in Award Winning Documentary

You may not have noticed 10 year old Maggie Mayer at Edgewood's Community Day last year, but her camera didn't miss much. Maggie shot a three minute documentary of the festivities including the booth set up at the baseball field, the race, the activities, the symphony, and the fireworks display. Her talent and hard work earned second place and a cash prize in a nationwide contest sponsored by the website MeetmeattheCorner.org. The video contest, Summer in My *Town*, is designed to encourage kids to build an online community by filming virtual "field trips" of a summer event in their town.

Maggie's film stood out, as Donna Guthrie, founder of MeetmeattheCorner. org explains: "Maggie is a good reader and the voiceovers were clear and full of expression. You could tell that Maggie really loves this event and she did a fine job of telling [Edgewood's] story."

Maggie learned about the contest through her mom, who read about it in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette. Maureen Mayer thought it was perfect for her daughter, who had begun filming "home shows" since receiving a video camera as a birthday present. Maggie's "home shows" are short films documenting events in her life. She taught herself to edit her footage, adding voiceovers, music, and credits, using Windows Movie Maker software. The software came with the family's computer and Maggie, "really just discovered it all herself and applied it," said Paul Mayer, Maggie's father.

Soon after receiving her camera, Maggie began presenting friends and family members with mini documentaries of their special occasions. In one, she edited footage of her cousin's thirteenth birthday dinner, adding music

and credits. She even has her own production company, Maggie Mayer Films, complete with her own logo.

Maggie, a lifelong Edgewoodian, says events like Community Day and Light Up Night make the borough special to her. Her winning video has had over 500 people view it to date. She thinks it is exciting that so many people are learning about her hometown, but her father may be her biggest fan. "My dad watches it all the time," she said. "He goes over to the computer and randomly watches it."

The video has made quite a splash around town. It was shown at the Edgewood Borough Council meeting and the Edgewood Foundation plans to use it. Maggie will also enter the film in her school's talent show. Maggie has continued to hone her skills. She is currently working on a film about a sledding outing with a friend. Her next project will be to work on an animated video. Maggie remains humble about her accomplishments, taking time to mention her "stars." "Hanna [Wells] and Anna [Okada], the two stars, I think are happy that they are on [the film], and I think they are happy for me as well," she said. She is saving the prize money she won to buy a better camera and a printer.


Be Heart Healthy



2009 Millage Tax

Happy New Year! The borough is currently preparing to pass its millage tax ordinance for 2009. We are extremely pleased to have passed a budget that again retains our millage at the current rate of 6.661.

Edgewood Avenue Development

The borough would like to thank everyone who took the time to complete the Edgewood Avenue survey. We will move forward with the completion of the development plan for Edgewood Avenue in 2009. The borough just received approval for an \$80,000 grant towards the final renovaof the train tions station. Approximately \$125,000 in overall work is needed and the borough has received positive responses from potential funders for the remaining \$45,000. We are optimistic that the final renovations will be completed later this year.

Right to Know

The borough will be passing a new policy under the state's Right To Know Act. Borough residents, by law, have always had the ability to see public records. The state's act creates a more specific process in making those requests and insures that communities are providing information in a timely fashion. The borough will now have an Open Records Officer responsible for answering those requests. Oh, Rats!

We have been receiving calls from residents about the appearance of rats around the borough. It seems that the recent work to the parkway has disrupted the rat population in the area. There are factors that can contribute to the pests staying around your neigh-


borhood. I realize that when it is zero degrees outside and your dog decides he needs to go out at 2 a.m., picking up after him is not likely to be the first thing on your mind. However, dog droppings can be one reason rats decide to take up residence around your house. Bird feeders also can attract rats. It is not just the bird feed, but the bird droppings that will keep rats around the area. I am not suggesting we need to get rid of all bird feeders, but excessive bird feeders can play a major part in seeing more and more rats. Toppled garbage cans can attract rats as well.

If you see rats, there are things that the borough can do. We can have our code enforcement officer check the neighborhood for conditions that may be contributing to the situation. This would include dog droppings, lids off garbage cans, or dumpsters with excessive garbage. If we find any of these factors, we will ask the respective property owners to take care of that issue. Our public works department will also come out and check the infrastructure in the vicinity of the problem to see if there are any road or sewer related issues that may be contributing factors. Many people incorrectly think that rats are not around in cold weather. Rats will show themselves periodically, but if you are seeing them regularly please call the borough and we will see what can be done.

Traffic Award

The Edgewood Police Department has received the AAA Community Traffic Safety Platinum Award for 2008. The award is given for outstanding service, dedication, and improving the quality of life through traffic safety and programming. Congratulations!

Buckle Up Edgewood

The Edgewood Police Department participated in the Buckle Up Pennsylvania, Click It or Ticket program over the Thanksgiving holiday. Officers set up minicades in several locations throughout the borough and extended enforcement patrols in many areas. Overall, 8,034 contacts were made with multiple citations written for traffic violations.

Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,196 calls for service in December 2008. There were 456 incidents reported, 183 complaints received and 11 accidents investigated, three of which resulted in personal injury, eight resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery,

aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 21 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, there was one for robbery and zero for motor vehicle theft, burglary, shoplifting and aggravated assault. There were six other crimes committed.

There were four adult and one juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 52 traffic citations and 88 parking citations. Zero arrests for driving under the influence were made. There was one vandalism/criminal mischief complaint and zero narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 17 false alarm calls, took 195 reports, responded to 16 public nuisance complaints, wrote two non-traffic citations and responded to 18 calls for medical assistance.

Some of you may only see us going to or from a call but behind the scenes these are hard working, dedicated fire fighters that take great pride in improving not only themselves but the service the department provides the borough.

Mel Douglass Scholarships to Be Awarded Again

Are you a high school senior with an outstanding record of community service? Then you have the opportunity to earn a scholarship from the Mel Douglass Fund. These scholarships honor the memory of Mel Douglass, who provided exceptional leadership and volunteer service to numerous Edgewood organizations. Last year, three high school seniors from Edgewood earned scholarships for their community service achievements. The scholarships are available again this year to graduating high school seniors, living in Edgewood, who are planning to pursue degrees.

The 2009 Mel Douglass Scholarships will be presented at the annual Edgewood Foundation Senior Brunch on May 3. The primary scholarship is \$4,000, paid in \$1,000 installments for each year of undergraduate school. Honorable mention scholarships of \$500 are also available.

Mel Douglass grew in up Edgewood. He graduated from Edgewood High School and from the University of Pittsburgh. Mel married his high school sweetheart, raised two wonderful children in Edgewood, and launched a successful career in business. Before he passed in an airplane accident in 1994, Mel actively volunteered in multiple community service roles in the borough, ranging from volunteer fireman to Little League coach to church deacon. These facts only hint at Mel's true legacy, which is the wide circle of lives he enriched with his larger-than-life personality, unquenchable

spirit, and commitment to serving others. A group of his friends started the Mel Douglass Fund to help sustain his legacy via scholarships.
