Brian Horner Sworn in as Junior Council Person

On Monday, August 17, Brian Horner was sworn in as the Borough of Edgewood's fourth Junior Council Person. Brian is the son of Laura and Kevin Horner of Maple Avenue.

Brian is a junior at Central Catholic High School where he plays varsity soccer and is active in the Spanish and Latin clubs. He is also a member of the Salient Youth program, a club that provides its members with philanthropic opportunities such as working in a soup kitchen.

Brian's interest in volunteerism helped lead him to his position as junior council person. "I am very interested in the way government works, especially local government," Brian said. "I want to learn as much as possible about it, to learn how it functions."

Brian's mother, Laura, believes this experience will give him a deeper respect for volunteer work. "I think this is a wonderful opportunity for Brian to see that all communities need a lot of support to operate," she said. "Even small communities, like ours, need an extraordinary amount of volunteer work to keep going. It is great that he is getting to see that first hand at this point in his life."

Edgewood Borough Council Vice-President Heidi McDonald said it was that interest in charitable pursuits that brought Brian to the council. "We had three very strong applicants this year, but Brian stood out due to his history of volunteerism in and around Edgewood, and with the Special Olympics," she said. "Additionally, Mr. Horner expressed an interest in pursuing a career in either law or public policy, for which this position would constitute a valuable learning experience. We are glad to have him and feel that he will do a good job representing the borough's youth."

This is the fourth year of the Junior Councilperson (JCP) Program. Instituted in 2005 using a template from the Pennsylvania Association of Boroughs (PSAB), the JCP Program underwent some enhancements in Edgewood which allow involved individuals to use their JCP term to satisfy the PA Department of Education's graduation requirements for community service. Edgewood's enhancements have since been adopted by the PSAB and are used throughout Pennsylvania. Council Member Heidi McDonald, who spearheaded the Edgewood program, is not running for re-election, but will remain Mr. Horner's advisor until June while a new Council advisor is trained for 2010.

Previous junior council persons were Reese McArdle, Emily Bush and Anne Hazlett.





Safety Corner

It's hard to believe that summer is gone and we are faced with spending more time indoors, although I will admit that football season takes the edge off. With the arrival of cooler weather, here comes our busy season! If you haven't already done so, may I suggest that you have your furnace checked by a qualified heating and air conditioning shop to assure that it is in good working order. If you have a fireplace, have that checked by a chimney sweep to assure there is no build up of creosol. Remember to check your smoke detectors; you should have one on every level of the house and in each bedroom just above the door. The reason for having smoke detectors in the bedroom is because a study found that if the bedroom door is closed, most people will sleep through a smoke detector activating in the hallway. A carbon monoxide alarm should also be placed outside each sleeping area. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless and tasteless gas that is deadly. Finally, more home fires are caused by the careless use of candles than anything else. Never leave a candle unattended and make sure that there is adequate clearance from any combustible surface. We once responded to a house fire that was caused by a cat



Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 43 Part I Crimes committed, there were zero for robbery and motor vehicle theft, 3 for burglary, 25 for shoplifting, one for aggravated assault and 14 other crimes.

There were 19 adult and 7 juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 89 traffic citations, 233 parking citations and made zero arrests for driving under the influence. There were four vandalism/criminal mischief complaint and one narcotics offense.

Officers also responded to 18 false alarm calls, took 345 reports, responded to 26 public nuisance complaints, wrote 11 non-traffic citations and responded to 14 calls for medical assistance.


