Work was scheduled to begin in late October. Once begun, the renovations should take 2 - 4 days to complete.

D.U.I CHECKPOINT

On Friday, September 23, 2011, Edgewood and Swissvale Police Departments conducted a D.U.I check point on South Braddock Avenue.

Officers set up the check point by placing signs and cones on S. Braddock and funneling traffic to a single lane in both directions. Three officers from each department stopped drivers, while a cover officer assisted with protecting this contact officer.

Contact officers advised the driver of the sobriety check point. They were then asked for their driver license, registration, and insurance card. While the operator obtained this information, officers checked for signs of impairment. Impairment could be indicated by blood shot eyes, slurred speech, or the odor of an alcoholic beverage.

Officers then determined if there were signs of impairment. If it was deemed that the operator of the vehicle was impaired, they were removed from the

vehicle and escorted to a holding area to perform a series of field sobriety tests.

If the operator failed the sobriety tests, their vehicle was impounded, officers obtained information for an arrest, and most drivers were then released to a sober relative. The impaired driver would then receive charges by mail.





2012 Borough on Street Parking Permits & Borough Lot Permits

Each driver with a vehicle registered in the borough is able to purchase a residential on-street parking pass. A visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the borough. The fees for these on-street parking permits as well as borough off-street and recreational/commercial lots vehicles are listed below. Permits for 2012 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 5, 2011.

Applications for the Borough's offstreet parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2011.

On December 19, 2011 permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received then there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.

Visitor \$15 per year (\$7.50 after June 30, 2012)*

Borough Lot \$60 per year vehicle*
