



From The Manager's Desk

Each driver with a vehicle registered in the Borough is able to purchase a Residential on-street parking pass. A Visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the Borough. The fees for on-street parking permits, as well as Borough off-street lots and recreational/commercial vehicles, are listed below. Permits for 2015 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 1, 2014.

Applications for the Borough's off-street parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2014. On December 15, 2014, permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.

Parking Permit Fees are as follows:

Residential \$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2015)* Visitor \$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2015)* Borough Lot \$60 per vehicle*

Rates for Parking Larger Vehicles in Borough Lot at 2 Race Street Recreational vehicle \$240 per year* Commercial vehicle \$150 per year* *Please note that rates are subject to change

WINTER WEATHER REMINDERS

As we all prepare for the colder weather and snow, Edgewood Borough would like to remind homeowners to keep their sidewalks clear of snow and ice. If you will be out of town, please make plans to have a neighbor or professional shovel your walkways. One sure sign to burglars of an unoccupied residence is a snow-filled stairway or porch.

Borough ordinance requires that sidewalks be cleared within 24 hours of a snow event. Please do not shovel or blow snow onto public roadways, as this creates driving hazards. Failure to clear your sidewalks could result in citations and fines.

Also, please remember that even in cold and snowy weather, pet waste should be picked up and disposed of by the humans who are walking the pet. Please help us keep Edgewood a safe and walkable community, even in winter weather!



Edgewood Recycles

A Visit to Our Recycling Plant

This past summer I visited the Main Recycling Facility (MRF) for Waste Management, which handles curbside collected recycling for 75% of Western PA. My goal was to learn more about the recycling process so that I could better answer resident inquiries about recycling.

The MRF, located on Neville Island, is a sorting and bundling facility. They do not do any chemical processing of the items. Workers separate out the recycling into individual components, bale them up, and sell them on the global market. The plant operates 24 hours a day, Monday through Friday, with 130 employees.

The loose recyclables arrive in a big mix. Paper, plas-Aluminum can recycling is the biggest money-maktic, cardboard, glass, and cans are jumbled together into er for our recycling plant. Aluminum cans are sorted, a huge pile dumped by trucks. The pile is moved into crushed into big cubes, and sold to Anheuser-Busch, the sorting area, which handles 30 tons/hour. About 10 where they are formed into aluminum cans again with to 15% of the items are unrecyclable trash (hula hoops, about a 3-month turnaround time. hoses), which take time to sort and remove. 



PARKING PERMITS

It is the time of year to purchase your 2015 on-street and visitor Parking Permits. If you purchase an on-street parking permit, the correct place to adhere the permit is your back window, driver's side, lower corner. In the past, officers have written unnecessary parking tickets due to incorrect permit placement on side windows, bumpers, windshields, etc. Please help us prevent the inconvenience of getting a parking ticket despite having a valid permit. Place the on-street parking permit in the back window, driver's side, outer bottom corner.

Please hang visitor passes from your rear-view mirror. Officers have noticed that some visitors just lay the pass on the dash board. Please understand that once we write the parking ticket, we cannot void it. We will place the ticket on the windshield, and the vehicle owner will have to make a special trip to the borough building regarding the ticket.

Remember, officers enforce the borough no-parking ordinance from 3 a.m. - 5 a.m., when it is very dark. Please ask yourself, will they be able to see my permit? Officers look for the permits only where they are properly placed.

LIVABLE PITTSBURGH

Livable Pittsburgh—From the Ground *Up!* is a community-based ecology group that promotes Green Initiatives in Edgewood and neighboring communities. The organization was launched in late September with an Open Community Forum on environmental sustainability at the Mellor Community House. The meeting featured Forest Hills environmental scientist Patricia DeMarco as the keynote speaker. The forum was well attended and included local government leaders, representatives from Nine-Mile Run, the Edgewood Garden Club leadership and individuals from Edgewood and surrounding boroughs. Discussion continued about low-carbon initiatives achievable through cooperation with local govern-

ments, such as installation of bicycle racks and zip car stations at the borough building; more LED street lights; and personal, backyard efforts that support an ecological web of life.

Other events included a fall-season garden prep educational event at the Wilkins School Eco-Fest on October 11.

Look for up-coming events, which will include:

A February meeting to discuss a Nine-Mile Run proposal regarding storm water management, semi-permeable landscape features, and trees (urban canopy.) Other topics will be safe lawns and a community seed share.

An April meeting on safe lawns for barefoot toes and paws. The Keynote speaker will be Dr. Sharna Olfman of Insight Pittsburgh, editor of the Childhood in America series from Praeger Press, on the impact of neurotoxins on children's physical and mental health.



he Edgewood Reading and Planting Program


