From The Manager's Desk

E ach driver with a vehicle registered in the Borough is able to purchase a Residential on-street parking pass. A Visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the Borough. The fees for on-street parking permits, as well as Borough off-street lots and recreational/commercial vehicles, are listed below. Permits for 2016 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 1, 2015.

Applications for the Borough's off-street parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2015. On December 14, 2015, permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.

Parking Permit Fees are as follows: Residential Permit \$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2016)* Visitor Permit \$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2016)* Borough Parking Lot Fees \$60 per vehicle*

Rates for Parking Larger Vehicles in Borough Lot at 2 Race Street: Recreational vehicle \$240 per year* Commercial vehicle \$150 per year* *Please note that rates are subject to change **SPECIAL NOTE:** Eastern Area Prehospital Services will be holding a Free Flu Shot Clinic on Wednesday, October 14 from 3-4 p.m. and 6-8 p.m. at the Borough Building.


George Fuller (R)

HALLOWEEN SAFETY

Please do your part to make this Halloween fun and safe! Make sure your children's costumes are visible at night and have reflective material. Consider carrying glow sticks or lights while trick-or-treating. Make sure costumes are short enough so they are not tripping hazards. Halloween is typically one of the most exciting occasions for young children, so remind your kids to look both ways before crossing the street. And of course, parents-check sweets before children eat them! We wish everyone a safe and happy Halloween!

YELLOW CURBS

Officers have noticed an increase in residents and visitors parking along yellow curbs. It may not seem like a big issue, but it is a very dangerous practice. There are several reasons why the yellow curbs exist. The main reason for painted curbs is our resident's safety.



As the leaves begin to fall, please remember to leave all of the storm drains open and free of debris. It can be very dangerous during a heavy rain if the water has nowhere to go. This can lead to flooding and property damage. If possible, rake your leaves to the end of the yard for pick up, and try not to place them in the roadways.

As you approach an intersection, it is vitally important to have a clear line of sight of oncoming traffic. One of our biggest concerns is being able to get an emergency vehicle to a scene when needed without delay. Edgewood streets can be very tight with parked cars, and it can be difficult, if not impossible to get a fire truck to a scene if cars are parked illegally. Recently, Eastern Area Ambulance purchased a new ambulance that is much larger than a traditional ambulance. This ambulance needs all the room it can get to negotiate around our streets.

Another concern for the illegally parked vehicles is pedestrian traffic. The vellow curbs are painted up to the crosswalks, as well as both sides of the crosswalks. If a vehicle is parked illegally, it will make it difficult for a pedestrian to cross safely, and for traffic to see the pedestrian.








A note from the tax collector...

The 2015 Edgewood Borough Real Estate tax is due at penalty until December 15. After this date it will be turned over to the delinquent tax collector.

The 2015 Woodland Hills School tax is due at face until October 31. If you are paying in installments your second installment is also due by October 31. The third installment will be due by Feb 28, 2016. Please remember that the second and third installment coupons are on the same paper-no other coupons will be sent out. It is your responsibility to remember when the third installment is due.

I would like to remind everyone that when you are making out your check for payment to please make sure the check is legible and written for the correct amount. If the bank can't read it, it will be returned. If it is at the end of the collection period and I have to return it to you, you will have to pay the penalty amount.

If a mortgage company is no longer paying your taxes, call the Allegheny County Treasurers office at 412-350-4100 and change the mailing address where your tax bill is sent.

The Borough tax comes out in April and the school tax comes out the first of July. If you do not receive your bill, call my office at 412-731-0200. Remember it is your responsibility to make sure your taxes are paid in a timely manner.

My office will be closed October 28 through November 4. All payments due by October 31 can be mailed or placed in my mail slot and will be taken care of upon my return. The Borough office staff cannot give you a receipt for any taxes that are left with them.
