## From The Manager's Desk

Each driver with a vehicle registered in the Borough is able to purchase a Residential on-street parking pass. A Visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the Borough. The fees for on-street parking permits, as well as Borough off-street lots and recreational/commercial vehicles, are listed below. Permits for 2016 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 1, 2015.

Applications for the Borough's off-street parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2015. On December 14, 2015, permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.

Parking Permit Fees are as follows:

Residential Permit \$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2016)\* Visitor Permit \$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2016)\* Borough Parking Lot Fees \$60 per vehicle\*

Rates for Parking Larger Vehicles in Borough Lot at 2 Race Street: Recreational vehicle \$240 per year\* Commercial vehicle \$150 per year\*

However, due to the New Year's Day holiday, the first day of Republic's Service in the Borough will be Saturday, January 2. #### **CHRISTMAS TREE SAFETY TIPS**

Each year, fire departments respond to an average of 210 structure fires caused by Christmas trees. Carefully decorating Christmas trees can help make your holidays safer.

#### Picking the tree

- If you have an artificial tree, be sure it is labeled, certified, or identified by the manufacturer as fire retardant.
- Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

#### Placing the tree

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 1"-2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.

#### Lighting the tree

- Use lights that have the label of an independent testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections.
   Connect no more than three strands of mini string sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of LED strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

#### **After Christmas**

Get rid of the tree when it begins dropping needles. Dried-out trees are a fire danger
and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.
Check with your local community to find a recycling program. Bring outdoor
electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.





The holidays are a time when thieves and con artists are frequently on the prowl. Here are some tips from the Edgewood Police Department to help keep your home, your car, your possessions, and your family safe.

#### **Keeping Your Home Safe**

- We all want our homes to reflect the joy of the season, but avoid displaying gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway.
- Arrange to have packages delivered to a neighbor if you're not home to receive them.
- Packages left on porches or doorsteps are "easy picking" for thieves. It also draws unwanted attention to your
- Consider simple outside decorations. Elaborate or large lawn pieces are often stolen right out of the lawn.
- Be sure not to obscure the view from vour windows. You need a clear view of your property.
- · Always lock your home's doors and windows, even if you're only gone for a few minutes.
- Compact or dispose of packaging discreetly. Often criminals will spot something you've discarded and can target you for their next burglary or theft.

- When leaving town, have a trusted friend or neighbor take care of your home. Never cancel general deliveries such as mail, newspapers, and other services when leaving town or going on vacation.
- Notify your local police precinct when you're planning an extended absence. They can issue a vacation watch or directed patrol for your home.

#### **Keeping Your Neighborhood Safe**

- First, share these tips with your neighbors. Establish a network with your neighbors and make a plan for mutual protection and notification.
- Get your Neighborhood Watch group together and go caroling. Visit the elderly and others in your area that may be isolated during the holidays.

#### **Staying Safe While Shopping**

- Always lock your car and close the windows, even if you're only gone a few moments. When possible, lock all merchandise or packages in the trunk of your car. Load your packages before departing, not at the next destination.
- Shop with at least one partner. Have your car or house key in your hand as you approach the door. If attacked use those keys as weapons!
- Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you. Look inside your car and around it as you approach.
- Be extra careful with purses and wallets. Carry a purse under your arm. Keep wallets in an inside pocket.

#### • Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.

- Avoid street vendors—many times these hucksters are selling stolen or unlicensed merchandise.
- Plan your trips. Instead of one big shopping trip, try several small ones. This will cut down on the amount of money you carry, the packages you'll be encumbered with, and it will make your shopping less stressful.
- Walk everywhere with a sense of purpose—show you are calm, confident and know where you are going.
- · Park in well-lit areas that will be welllit when you return.

#### Connie Black Winner of the 2015 Limpert Award

The Edgewood Foundation is proud to announce Connie Black as this year's recipient of the William D. Limpert Award for Community Service. The award was established to recognize an Edgewood resident who has contributed to making our community a desirable place to live, and improving the life of those who live here.

Connie, who has lived in the Borough for 40 years, might be called a renaissance volunteer. She has worked tirelessly in a variety of roles, from leadership—by serving on Borough Council, the C.C. Mellor Library Board and as an Elder and Deacon at First Presbyterian Church of Edgewood (FPCE), to "roll-up-your-sleeves" work on numerous community organizations.

Before retiring, Connie worked at the VA with their Drug and Alcohol Program, and raised her son, Christopher, a successful restauranteur who lives with his family in Portland, Oregon.

When it comes to nitty gritty work, Connie is exemplary in her efforts. Over the years she has delivered Meals on Wheels, organized and cooked for Civic Club and Cot Club, and worked on Borough projects such as The Edgewood 5K, bulb planting and Earth Day clean-up. She has collected newspapers from friends and neighbors—first, before Edgewood had curb-side pick-up, she took them for recycling, and now delivers them to animal shelters for use in the kennels. She also is a member of the Nine Mile Run Watershed Association and

works regularly with other volunteers to remove trash from Nine Mile Run.

In recent years, Connie's two biggest commitments have been to FPCE's afterschool program, FROGS, and the Library's annual book sale. The FROGS Program began 13 years ago to provide a safe place for elementary school children to have fun, make friends, read and play. Connie was an inaugural volunteer with the program. Since then, twice a week during the school year, as well as many summers, she has spent at least three hours a day helping young children with homework, reading, playing games, and preparing healthy snacks and meals. These children from our schools and our community have enjoyed the nurturing and care of "Mrs. Connie Black," as she is fondly known to her Dewey St. neighbor children.

As a loyal volunteer for C.C. Mellor Library's Annual Book Sale, Connie is involved daily, from start to finish. Her efforts begin with helping arrange the thousands of books before the sale to breaking down and repacking the

remaining books after the four day sale has ended. And during the event she assists with sales, information, and fast-paced customer service. As library staffer Amy Brazell pointed out, "The sale is not possible without the work of volunteers like Connie."

When asked to comment on this award, Connie deflected any praise. She believes that when you see something that needs to be done, you do it. She said, "I am just one of many who keep this Borough strong."


#### HISTORICAL SOCIETY

A historical marker stands at the corner of South Braddock and Greendale Avenues marking the life and accomplishments of Jane Grey Swisshelm—a journalist, publisher, abolitionist and women's rights advocate. December marks the 200th anniversary of her birth. Please join the Edgewood Historical Society at 7 p.m. on Monday, December 14, at the Edgewood Club for a birthday party celebrating the notable former resident.

Born on Dec. 6, 1815, in Pittsburgh, Jane Grey Cannon later lived in Wilkinsburg and then in what is now Edgewood after marrying farmer James Swisshelm—the family after which Swissvale is named. She first encountered slavery while living briefly in Louisville, Ky., later worked as an army nurse in the Civil War and befriended Mary Todd Lincoln.

Mrs. Swisshelm founded newspapers in Pittsburgh, Minnesota and Washington, D.C., where she worked for the federal government during the administration of President Andrew Johnson. In 1881, she published an autobiography. Jane Grey Swisshelm died July 22, 1884, and is buried in Allegheny Cemetery. Pittsburgh's Swisshelm Park neighborhood is named in her honor.






