# Stormwater Management

Stormwater refers to water from rain and snow that flows across the ground and pavement. Stormwater seeps into the ground and drains into storm sewers, the drains at street corners. Stormwater "goes bad" when the following things get mixed in with it:

Vehicles drip fluids onto the road, and rain carries it into the storm sewers.



Pet waste can also get carried away by storm water.

> Cleaning and Lawn chemicals are also washed away into the ground and the storm sewers.

### **CLEAN WATER TIPS**

• Take your car to a car wash, don't wash your car on the street where the water can run into the storm sewer.

- · Pick up your dog's doo.
- If you have to use chemicals on your lawn, use them only according to package directions and dispose of them properly.
- Make sure your car doesn't leak any fluids onto the ground.
- Don't pour any chemicals or oil into storm drains.
- · Clean up garbage and litter lying in the street.
- Build a rain garden!

All of that material finds its way to creeks, streams and fresh water sources.

### Understanding the MS4 Program

#### What is the MS4 Program?

Intreated or uncontrolled storm water runoff is the number one cause of impairment in our local waterways. Polluted runoff is often transported through municipal drainage systems until it eventually discharges into streams, lakes and rivers untreated. An MS4, or Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, is comprised of drainage systems including streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ponds, ditches, manmade channels and storm pipes owned by a state, county, city, township, borough or other public entity. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Storm Water Phase II regulations require a permit for storm water discharges from MS4s, mainly those located in urbanized areas. Therefore, most townships and boroughs, including Edgewood Borough, are required to comply with the MS4 program.

MS4 Programs are intended to improve our nation's surface waters by reducing the quantities of pollutants that are picked up by runoff and transported into the storm sewer systems during rainfall events. As part of the MS4 Program, municipalities must obtain a permit to discharge storm water into local waterways. This permit requires municipalities to implement and maintain a storm water management program that (1) reduces the discharge of pollutants to the maximum extent possible (2) protects water quality; and (3) satisfies the water quality requirements of the Federal Clean Water Act. In Pennsylvania, the MS4 program is administered by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

The MS4 program has six elements termed "minimum control measures" that when implemented should result in a significant reduction in pollutants discharged into receiving waters. The six minimum control measures and the actions required include the following:

Public Education and Outreach -Distribute educational materials and conduct outreach to inform citizens about the impacts that storm water runoff has on water quality.

Public Participation/Involvement - Provide opportunities for citizens to participate in the storm water management program or other programs which improve water quality.

Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination - Develop and implement a plan to detect and eliminate non-storm water discharges into the storm water system.

Construction Site Runoff Control -Develop, implement and enforce an erosion and sediment control program for construction site activities that disturb one acre or greater.

Post-Construction Runoff Control -Develop, implement and enforce a program to address discharges of post-construction storm water runoff from new development or redevelopment areas.

Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping - Develop and implement a program that reduces or prevents pollutant runoff from municipal operations.

All municipalities should be committed to improving water quality through better management of storm water runoff. Every resident can participate in their municipal storm water program by reducing or preventing pollutant runoff from their own property and by reporting any non-storm water discharges into the Borough's drainage system.

#### What can we do to help keep waterways clean?

There are numerous things we can all do on a daily basis to keep pollution out of our waterways. The following are just a few things we can all do to help improve water quality:

- 1. Never dump anything into storm drains, swales or streams.
- 2. Pick up litter from the street before it gets into storm drains.
- 3. Use limited amounts of fertilizer.
- 4. If you must use pesticides, search for an environment-friendly brand.
- 5. Recycle motor oil, paint, and other hazardous chemicals. Never dump such materials down the drain or into the storm system.
- 6. Recycle glass, plastic and aluminum.
- 7. Always pick up your pet's waste or harmful bacteria can get into our water!

#### What types of connections are prohibited?

#### The following connections are strictly prohibited:

- Any drainage pipe, channel or ditch, whether on the surface or subsurface, which allows non-storm water discharge, including sewage, process wastewater, and wash water, to enter to storm sewer system, and any connections to the storm drain system from indoor drains and sinks.
- Roof Drains Roof drains shall not be connected to streets, sanitary or storm sewer or roadside ditches, except when it is more advantageous to connect directly to street or storm sewers. Connection of roof drains to street or roadside ditches may be permitted on a case-by-case basis. Roof drains shall discharge to infiltration areas or vegetative BMPs (Best Management Practices) to the maximum extent practical. This will help to promote groundwater charge and reduce runoff.
- Water disposal prohibitions It is illegal to dispose of or leave any refuse, rubbish, garbage, litter or other discarded materials in any public or private property, driveway, parking area, street, alley, sidewalk or other component of the Borough's storm sewer system so that such materials may cause or contribute to pollution. Garbage deposited in streets in proper waste receptacles for the purpose of routine collection is exempted from this prohibition.
- Any drain or pipe connected to the municipality's storm sewer system from a commercial or industrial land use which has not been documented in plans, maps, or equivalent records, and approved by the municipality.

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



#### WHAT'S YOUR SPEED?

▲ aybe you have noticed our new speed sign. The Edgewood Police now **IVI** have a portable electronic speed sign. The sign is very versatile and can be mounted on any telephone pole, speed limit sign, or even a cross walk sign.

You may ask yourself, what's the point? The most important reason for the sign is to make drivers aware that they may be potentially speeding. Speed limits are in place for the safety of the residents of our community. Driving just a little over the speed limit can have serious consequences. Our borough has tight streets, with mostly on-street parking. You never know when a small child, animal, or even an adult is going to walk out in between cars. Staying at or under the speed limit greatly reduces your chances of being injured, injuring another person, or getting a speeding ticket.

The new speed sign also has the capability of storing what speeds the vehicles are going, and producing an average speed. This feature allows officers to better concentrate on problem areas. If the sign indicates that a certain street has a high amount of vehicles over the speed limit, at a certain time, we will be enforcing that area.

Please obey all speed limits and traffic laws so your family and the residents of this borough continue to keep Edgewood a safe place to live.




