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Edgewood Recycles

Recycling Paper – Fun Facts!

Here are some facts about recycling paper. Be sure to do your part and recycle in Edgewood! Recycling is picked up every other week. Be sure items are clean and dry, and placed loose in the recycling bin (do not use plastic bags). Thanks for conserving!

- To produce each week's Sunday newspapers, 500,000 trees must be cut down.
- Recycling a single run of the Sunday New York Times would save 75,000 trees.
- If all our newspaper was recycled, we could save about 250,000,000 trees each year!
- If every American recycled just onetenth of their newspapers, we would save about 25,000,000 trees a year.
- During World War II when raw materials were scarce, 33% of all paper was recycled. After the war, this number decreased sharply.
- If you had a 15-year-old tree and made it into paper grocery bags, you'd get about 700 of them.
- A supermarket could use all of them in under an hour! This means in one year, one supermarket goes through 60,500,000 paper bags! Imagine how many supermarkets there are in the U.S.!
- The average American uses seven trees a year in paper, wood, and other products made from trees. This amounts to about 2,000,000,000 trees per year.
- The amount of wood and paper we throw away each year is enough to heat 50,000,000 homes for 20 years.

- When you smell a dump, what you actually smell is the paper in the dump!
- Approximately 1 billion trees worth of paper are thrown away every year in the U.S.
- Americans use 85,000,000 tons of paper a year; about 680 pounds per person.
- The average household throws away 13,000 separate pieces of paper each year. Most is packaging and junk mail.
- 27% of the newspapers produced in America are recycled.
- Each ton (2000 pounds) of recycled paper can save 17 trees, 380 gallons of oil, three cubic yards of landfill space, 4000 kilowatts of energy, and 7000 gallons of water. This represents a 64% energy savings, a 58% water savings, and 60 pounds less of air pollution!
- The 17 trees saved (above) can absorb a total of 250 pounds of carbon dioxide from the air each year. Burning that same ton of paper would create 1500 pounds of carbon dioxide.
- The construction costs of a paper mill designed to use waste paper is 50 to 80% less than the cost of a mill using new pulp.

n November 4, El Burro Dos celebrated its one-year anniversary in Regent Square with its signature flair and funky style. The flagship El Burro on the North Side recently turned six as well, and owner Wes De Renouard is pleased with how his creations have been received.

Wes, and his childhood friend and business partner Derek Burnell (of Umami and Cantina in Lawrenceville) grew up in southern California. Though successful in other areas of business, the childhood dream of opening up SoCal styled taco shops across the country still burned in their brains. Wes and Derek trekked to Pittsburgh, to bring the warmth of southern Cali cuisine to chillier climates, where it's needed the most.

Though his first El Burro on the North Side has been open longer, the "Dos" location in Regent Square is a breath of fresh air to our neighborhood. The menu is hip and cool, with loads of both meat-loving as well as vegan and vegetarian options, and the price is right with dishes typically under \$10. Each dish is a crowd-pleaser, with plenty on the plate. Though

Wes's mom and sister have both been vegetarian and vegan, and the sensitivity is clear on El Burro's menu. They have been featured at the Vegan festival and about one third of their customers are vegan or vegetarian. It's no surprise when vegan cheese and fresh, interesting ingredients are on the menu. Of course, traditional meat-eaters won't be disappointed by the variety of options either. Clearly, it is possible to please everyone. (For the low-carb folks, you can even get your burrito in a bowl instead of a tortilla—they've thought of everything.)

Recently, El Burro Uno and Dos paired to raise money for disaster relief in Puerto Rico and the earthquake in Mexico City. During their special, customers raised over \$1,200 to send to Unicef and Mexico City. Keep your eyes open for more specials like this from El Burro in the future.

Wes is very community-oriented and hopes to see more events like Second Saturdays in the Square to bring everyone together. He enjoys the family-friendliness of Edgewood, and that groups of people will walk the square together. He's hopeful to see more community activities bring even more people out and about to Regent Square.

If you need a way to warm up through the winter, stop by El Burro for a taste of southern California. You'll be glad you did!


From The Manager's Desk

Each driver with a vehicle registered in the Borough is able to purchase a Residential on-street parking pass. A Visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the Borough. The fees for on-street parking permits, as well as Borough off-street lots and recreational/commercial vehicles, are listed below. Permits for 2018 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 1, 2017.

Applications for the Borough's off-street parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2017. On December 15, 2017, permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.

Parking Permit Fees are as	follows:
Residential Permit	\$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2018)*
Visitor Permit	\$20 per year (\$10 after June 30, 2018)*
Borough Parking Lot Fees.	\$60 per vehicle*



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Police Report

NALOXONE


In the ongoing effort to curb overdose deaths from opioids like heroin, the Edgewood Police are now trained, and carrying this new tool. Naloxone, a medication that rapidly reverses the effects of an opioid overdose, has long been used by emergency medics, but now it's being deployed to police departments at the front line of the state's opioid crisis.

Naloxone blocks opioid receptors in the brain, and almost immediately counteracts an overdose, although it may take several doses. There are almost no negative side effects, even if it's given to someone by accident that isn't on opioids.

Although some police departments do not carry this life saving drug, the Edgewood Police Department feels that it is a necessary tool to preserve life. As a police department, we are very fortunate to have a fire department that responds quickly to emergency calls, and also carries Naloxone. Our local ambulance service, Eastern Area, also carries the life saving drug. You may ask, why do the police need to have this drug when other first responders already have it. The answer is, the police are always out in the field, patrolling the streets. The police will always be the first on scene, and in a life or death situation, every second counts.

There is a certain stigma when it comes to hearing overdose, many people automatically think "junkie", and quickly come to conclusions. Naloxone not only counteracts a heroin overdose, it also counteracts an overdose on commonly prescribed pain medication. Hearing of an overdose, it may just be someone's grandmother who accidentally took to many pain pills after a hip replacement. Many people who turn to opioids, such as heroin, started off on prescription pain pills and became addicted.

As a police department, we are proud of the job that we do, and are fortunate to have another tool to help save lives. We realize that every patient we may use Naloxone on is someone's mother, father, son, daughter, brother, or sister etc. We strive to treat everyone with respect and dignity, no matter the situation, and will always go the extra mile to help someone in need.

Choosing the Right Salt for You

Like trimming your lawn in the summer or raking leaves in the fall, salting your walkways to keep them safe and ice-free in the winter is an annual ritual. Sodium chloride (rock salt) is the most inexpensive and commonly used salt for removing ice from walkways, but it can also have unintended and undesirable effects on your landscape, masonry, and pets.

There are also less harmful options for de-icing that allow you to maintain safe walkways in winter without the negative impacts of sodium chloride. Two alternative options that can be commonly found in hardware stores are calcium chloride and magnesium chloride based products. Calcium chloride is less harmful to trees than rock salt, comes in pellet form, and



works below 0 degrees F. However, it can also be a skin irritant and overzealous application can damage concrete, meaning proper precaution and moderation are key in its use. Magnesium chloride works down to -13 degrees F and is less damaging to concrete, less toxic to plants, and less corrosive to metals than any other salt. Additionally, although they can be more expensive and harder to find than the other two, products that contain potassium chloride as the primary melting agent are the friendliest solution overall. These types of ice-melting products cause no harm to vegetation or pets, and are safe for skin contact.

Whether you are working to mitigate salt damage or just trying to get the most out of your ice melt, surfaces should always be cleared of snow before application. Also, consider mixing sand into the rock salt and sweeping up leftover material when temperatures rise to reduce overall salt use in the winter. Finally, as a general rule of thumb, most pet-friendly de-icing salts are less harmful to plants, metal, and masonry as well, but be sure to check the label to understand the active melting ingredients and effective temperature range.


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

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Historical Society

French-born artist George Hetzel is known as the founder of the Scalp Level School of painting after first seeing the idyllic wooded area in Cambria County in 1866 and encouraging other artists to join him to paint scenes from the rural landscape "en plein air"—on site in nature. An instructor at the Pittsburgh School of Design for Women, Hetzel also was an early Edgewood resident. The family lived on Washington Street.

Yet George wasn't the only accomplished artist in the Hetzel clan. His daughter Lila also became an acclaimed painter.

Born in 1873, Lila B. Hetzel trained at the Pittsburgh School of Design, where she won a Gold Medal for her nature paintings. She later trained in Europe before returning to Western Pennsylvania.

The family moved from Edgewood in 1897 to a Somerset

County farmhouse that came to be known as the Hetzel Studio. Lila and her father painted landscapes, fields, rural bridges and autumn scenes. After her father's death in 1899, Lila returned to Pittsburgh and split her time between the city and Somerset. She became a charter member of the Associated Artists of Pittsburgh, which was organized in 1910.

Her work was featured at the Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh Playhouse, Arts and Crafts Center of Pittsburgh, Gillespie Galleries, Westmoreland County Museum of Art and Jennerstown Art Gallery as well as exhibitions in Somerset, Ligonier and Indiana, Pennsylvania., according to Roughton Galleries.

Lila Hetzel died 50 years ago, in 1967.

ALCOSAN AWARDS GRANT TO EDGEWOOD

\$66,300 is reimbursement for sewer work

The Allegheny County Sanitary Authority Board of Directors has approved a \$66,300 grant for Edgewood as reimbursement for part of the rehabilitation of its sanitary sewer system.

The project, already completed, carried a total cost of \$220,725, and AL-COSAN's share covers 30 percent. A total of 2,600 feet of sanitary sewer pipe was rehabilitated. The work is expected to remove 130,000 gallons of stormwater from the sewer collection system.

The award to Edgewood is part of a package of \$4.8 million in matching grants for 25 projects that will extend the innovative work that began earlier this year with ALCOSAN's first round of funding for its Green Revitalization of Our Waterways (GROW) program.

The grant offers are a portion of Cycle II of GROW, instituted to reduce the volume of sewer overflows within the ALCOSAN system. Together, these projects in 24 municipalities will remove nearly 30 million gallons of stormwater and ground water from the ALCOSAN system annually. Grants were awarded in Cycle I for 30 projects that will remove nearly 70 million gallons.

"ALCOSAN is gratified by the interest in the GROW program that is demonstrated by the volume of applications from our customer municipalities," said Board Chair Sylvia Wilson. "We are very pleased to make this second round of awards, and we look forward to continuing success going forward into 2018."

ALCOSAN created the GROW program in 2016 and immediately began working with its 83 member municipalities and municipal sewer authorities that send wastewater to its treatment facility. Any municipality or municipal sewer authority within the ALCOSAN service area is eligible for GROW

The GROW program is an essential part of ALCOSAN's long-term, green-first plan to create cleaner waterways in compliance with regulations of the federal Clean Water Act and the Pennsylvania Clean Streams Law and to help the municipalities in the ALCOSAN system fulfill their responsibilities under the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection and the Allegheny County Health Department.

A note from the real estate tax collector...

The 2017 Edgewood Borough Real Estate tax has been turned over to the delinquent tax collector. Late notices were sent out the end of October. The 2018 tax will be mailed out the first of April.

The 2017 Woodland Hills School tax has been turned over to the school district at the end of December unless you choose to pay in installments, with the first one paid by October 31. The second installment is due by January 31, 2018 and third one by March 31. If you have not made any payment on this tax then it was turned over to Jordan Tax Service as delinquent.

If you have changed your mailing address or changed mortgages companies you must notify my office and also the Allegheny County Treasurers office at 412-350-4100. The banks do not notify us!!

When paying your taxes please check that the numeric portion and the written portion match and that the check is signed and dated! If you are paying both taxes at the same time you must send 2 separate checks, one for Edgewood Borough and the other for Woodland Hills School District! If a check is returned for errors you will be charged into the next period. If you use your banks on-line payment service, allow enough lag time so you payment is received by the due date. Any check that is post dated will be returned, I will not hold checks on my desk! Any questions, please feel free to call my office at 412-731-0200, Tuesday and Thursday from 10am to 12 pm.
