Get the most out of your Hard To Recycle pick up

light bulbs or household chemicals that are taking up precious space in your home, make use of Republic Services Hard-To-Recycle and E-Waste pickup services! There is no additional charge for these services.

The best way to schedule a pickup is to call Republic's local phone number, 877-788-9400. Most pickups will be scheduled several days, even weeks, from the time you call. You may be required to put items in a special bag or tag it in a particular way. Be sure to keep your items indoors and only place them in the pickup area within 12 hours of pickup.

Hazardous Waste is different from • Gasoline e-waste, and the pickups are separate. Hazardous Waste includes batteries, light bulbs and chemicals. E-waste refers to any computer, television or electronic appliances. Pickups for these types of items will be separate. Hazardous Waste is typically picked up on Fridays, but you will be sent a kit prior to your pickup, so the pickup will be several days from when you make the call to schedule. E-Waste is picked up on a rotating basis.

Your hazardous waste and e-waste can now be safely collected from each home by calling 877-788-9400.

If you have electronic waste, batteries, Look through your home for hazardous items that need discarding-everything from batteries and paint to computers and chemicals—and feel secure knowing Republic Services will handle these special items; protecting both you and the environment!

> Residents who call will be asked to describe the items they want collected. They will be asked to use a special kit to collect the items, which will be delivered to them. Each kit includes a 42-gallon clear plastic bag and detailed instructions on how to safely package the items, along with a collection date. These items MUST be kept in a secure location; NOT at the curb, until collection. The only exception is a single item weighing 50 lbs. or more, such as a large TV, which must be placed at the curb.

> On the collection day, Republic Services personnel will collect the specially packaged items and recycle them.

Here is a list of items that Republic Services will collect (5 gallons or less)

- Paint (latex and oil-based)
- Paint thinners
- Solvents
- Oi
- Petroleum-based lubricants
- Ethylene
- Glycol
- Antifreeze
- Pesticides/herbicides
- Aerosols
- Mercury/mercury debris
- Light bulbs (fluorescents, compact fluorescents (CFL)
- High-intensity discharge (HID) lamps
- Batteries (lead acid, alkaline, NiCad)
- Pool chemicals/cleaners (acidic & basic)

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Republic Services will NOT accept the following:

- Radioactive compounds
- Smoke detectors
- Ammunition/explosives
- Tires
- Asbestos
- PCBs (Polychlorinated biphenyls)
- Pharmaceuticals/controlled substances
- Biological/infectious wastes
- Medical Sharps
- Fire Extinguishers
- Propane tank

Kalmeren Veterinary Acupuncture

Dr. Michelle Elgersma, DVA CVA

Zalmeren" is the Dutch word for calming, which Dr. Michelle Elgersma chose for her business because it seemed so appropriate for the work she does. Dr. Michelle is a veterinarian with over 20 years of experience helping to heal large and small animals (meaning horses, cows, sheep, goats as well as dogs and cats). When Dr. Michelle moved from New Jersey to Pittsburgh, she changed the direction of her animal care to a more Eastern, holistic approach, which she found to be "life-changing" during her studies.

Dr. Michelle worked as a typical veterinarian for many years before taking an acupuncture course almost on a whim. Through the course of the study, she found it to be a life-changing "a-ha" moment that led her completely change the modality of her work. Many people consider doing acupuncture for themselves for a variety of reasons, but are unaware of the benefits it can have for their animals, particularly older animals with troubles with arthritis or glaucoma. Dr. Michelle takes a more Eastern, holistic approach to wellness by attempting to treat the overall wellness of the animal, and not just the symptoms at hand. Of course, if there is a problem that needs antibiotics or western medicine, Dr. Michelle works closely with traditional vets and recommends regular upkeep for the health of your pets.

She did once treat a particular dog for glaucoma, just one day prior to the animal having its eye surgically removed. Her treatment was so successful, the dog was able to keep its eye, and the surgery was cancelled. That is a particularly successful case, but by using holistic treatments like acupuncture, just like humans, animals can see a great deal of benefit in their health. Wellness can be more than simply being free of diseases-it can also mean preventing problems and feeling comfortable and happy in one's body. Providing health treatment to your pet can mean a longer, happier life with your family member.

Dr. Michelle typically makes house calls, but also works out of the East End Veterinary Center in Shadyside. She also sees clients all over the city of Pittsburgh, not just our neighborhood. New clients can call, email or reach out through the form on her website. (Please note: if your pet is having an emergency, take it immediately to a veterinary office or animal emergency care facility.) Veterinary acupuncture can be a useful tool for older animals with pain or movement issues, but it can also assist



a wide variety of conditions like diabetes or renal diseases, which are common problems for cats. Dr. Michelle is well versed in working with a wide variety of animals, so if you're not sure she can treat your pet, you can always inquire.

Dr. Michelle is a five-year resident of Edgewood, and enjoys the walkability, friendliness and, of course, the urban canopy of the neighborhood. She hopes that our community can continue to build a local network for environmental and health progress to help all our neighbors to be as healthy and happy as possible. 

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

Learn About Laterals!

Sewer laterals are the pipes that connect your house to the main sewer line. It is important for them to be in good condition for 2 basic reasons:

- 1. To keep sewage in so that it can be safely transported to ALCOSAN, our regional sewer treatment plant. Although there are some perks of a leaky sewer lateral (fertilizer), it generally is not considered good. One sign that your lateral might not be in great condition is spots of lush green vegetation in your yard.
- 2. To keep stormwater and groundwater out. I&I (Inflow & Infiltration) is the lingo in the stormwater/sewer world. I&I is a large part of why our sewers are overwhelmed in rain events. Infiltration is when rain and groundwater enters cracked sewer pipes, including laterals. Inflow is when stormwater and groundwater enter through downspouts and catch basins. During wet weather, I&I can add as much as 3,000 gallons of stormwater per person per day to the sewer system. This is quite the burden on an already overwhelmed system.

So how can you help? Keeping your lateral in good condition is key. In Edgewood, homeowners are responsible for their lateral from the house to the sewer main. Sewer laterals have a life span of about 50 years so it's a good idea to have yours checked by a licensed plumber. Always make sure any repairs are permitted and performed by a plumber licensed by the Allegheny Health Department Plumbing Program.



Make the 2nd Count: A Message from Edgewood Borough Council

Guns, gun ownership, gun violence, and the Second Amendment are part of our daily political and societal dialogue. Elected officials swear to uphold the Constitution of the United States and have a duty to protect the safety and welfare of their communities and those who live and work in them. In consultation with our Police Department, Edgewood Council wanted to act in a way that would meet the responsibilities of good governance, uphold the rights of citizens and the rights of those working to ensure the safety and welfare of residents living within our community borders.

At a recent community safety meeting, Edgewood Borough Police Chief Robert Payne reported that one of the major facets in combatting gun violence is getting illegal weapons off the street. The ability to track where weapons come from helps law enforcement identify areas and trends in illegal gun procurement. Police can have a greater impact on gun violence when they are able to disrupt the flow of illegal (and often stolen) weapons into the hands of criminals.

While ordinances may fine gun owners for not reporting their gun stolen or lost, that is after the fact. The best ways to help law enforcement, our families, and our community is to promote responsible gun ownership and the importance of reporting lost or stolen guns in real time.

With all of this in mind, Edgewood Borough Council and Police Department are kicking off the "Make the 2nd Count" Campaign. On the Second day of every month, we're asking gun owners to perform the following safety checks:

- Verify the location of their gun(s);
- Confirm it is in a locked and secured case:
- See that it is unloaded;
- Check that the ammunition is stored separately in a locked and secured place;
- Know the keys for both the gun and ammunition are secured and out of reach of children.
- And, if any gun is missing that a report is filed with the Edgewood Police.

At the least, checking every month provides a time frame for owners and law enforcement of the theft/loss. It may save the life of a family member or neighbormore people are accidently shot by someone "just looking" at a family owned gun, or struggling with emotional issues. This also helps law enforcement track trends in types of theft and areas targeted in our community. Reporting a gun lost or stolen protects owners should their weapon be used in a crime and gives weight to the charges brought when a felon is found with a stolen weapon.

Gun ownership is a Right with responsibilities. Be a part of protecting our community. On the Second of every month, go through the check list. Keep your guns secured. NEVER LEAVE YOUR GUN IN YOUR CAR. And report any gun lost or stolen to Edgewood police as soon as it is discovered missing.



When you pay your taxes, please make sure you are paying the correct amount, that your written amount matches your numeric amount, and that you have signed and dated your check! You could be charged into the penalty period if you check is returned for errors or missing information and it is not returned to me by July 31.

The 2019 Woodland Hills School Tax should be mailed out July 1st and it will come from Jordan Tax Service because I am stepping back from my position as tax collector on June 30th. All changes will be noted on the tax bill and, for the Borough, on the website.
