

# From The Manager's Desk

Junior Councilperson Sought—Edgewood Borough Council is accepting applications for the Junior Council Person Program. High school and college aged individuals who are residents of the borough are encouraged to apply by submitting a letter of interest to borough council outlining why they want to be a JCP. As a JCP, you must attend monthly meetings, will be seated with council and participate in borough business and learn how a local government operates. A commitment of at least six months is required but an appointment can last for up to two years. # Advice from a longtime REALTOR

My previous installment shed light on the negative repercussions of the "Real Estate Love Letter". I would now like to start to look at the "offer" and the terms and conditions that can inhibit you from putting your best foot forward with the Seller from the start.

The price you offer a Seller is important but just as important can be the other terms in the agreement. One of the more important terms in the offer is the Initial Deposit which is often referred to as "Earnest Money" or "Good Faith Money". You are making your offer on that dream home. How much Earnest Money will you put down as a deposit? "Earnest" is defined as showing intense and sincere conviction. If your method of determining how much Earnest Money to deposit centers around figuring out how much you are willing to walk away from if you default, then you are going about this completely wrong.

The Earnest Money should show an intense and sincere conviction that you as a Buyer want to go through with the transaction and aren't going into the process already thinking about a way out. In other words, an amount considering the situation that would make you truly pause and where you would also feel the pain of defaulting on the transaction. The contract is written in way that if you aren't satisfied with inspections during that timeframe or something happens that is no fault of your own and your mortgage is rejected,

the Buyer gets that Earnest Money back. The only way the Buyer loses the Earnest Money is to stick it to the Seller and default on the contract refusing to close. The Seller may be out many thousands of dollars in moving expenses, leases, repairs, etc. Put yourself in the Seller's shoes for a minute and imagine the Seller is your Mother or Grandmother.

There is an old saying: "Put your money where your mouth is." So, when you are trying to put in your best offer, put down the best Earnest Money that you can. It could make the difference of being a winning bid or not



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# Tips for Winterizing Your Yard in the Watershed



As the fall weather turns cooler, it is that time of year when a gardener or homeowner must prepare the outside of their property for winter. As much as you may love spending time gardening and landscaping during the summer, some of the most important work you can do is in the fall by preparing for winter from a habitat and watershed ecosystem perspec-

tive. The goal is to create a welcoming environment for pollinators, birds, insects, and critters that are looking for high-energy food and places to find cover during winter weather.

### We encourage you to follow the steps listed below to winterize your yard:

- 1. Plant vegetation that produces berries, nuts, or seeds to offer winter food for wildlife.
- 2. Leave the dried stalks and seed heads of perennial flowers for food.
- 3. Plant native evergreens which provide much needed cover for birds and mammals.
- 4. Leave dead trees standing to provide safe habitat for small animals.
- 5. Create a brush pile of yard debris (branches, twigs, and leaves) for habitat.
- 6. Consider planting a cover crop to protect small animals and insects.
- 7. Let fallen leaves lie on the ground or use them as mulch in the garden.
- 8. If you must remove leaf litter, consider shredding it and adding to compost bin.

# Music Studio of Susanna Sonnenberg

e already know that Edgewood is a great place to be for anyone who has a love of music. Susanna Sonnenberg has made it her business to share her musical interest with the community, teaching lessons at her home studio, Music Studio of Susanna Sonnenberg.

Susanna, who is also the Associate Principal Violinist with the Pittsburgh Civic Orchestra, has been involved in music for much of her life. She started learning the violin in public school in 4th grade, and played in a number of youth orchestras and competitions. She earned her Bachelors in Fine Arts in Music Performance from SUNY Purchase and her Masters in Music from Lamont School of Music at the Univer-

sity of Denver. She also attended Carnegie Mellon University where she earned her Music Education Certification. She taught in public schools for 15 years in Georgia, North Carolina and Pennsylvania, and taught

private lessons on the side. "I became a music teacher because of my love of music and children. I found teaching fun and that the more I teach, the more I learn." She has been in Edgewood since 2015.

Susanna now offers beginner/intermediate/advanced violin and viola lessons, as well as beginning and intermediate cello lessons, 7 days a week. She teaches both children and adults, starting at age 5, with an annual spring recital each year for school age students, and a second one for adult students. Lessons are also available via online platforms, like Skype and Facetime. In fact, her 60+ students include people from 20 different states, and one international student in Finland. In the past she has had students in Italy, France, Singapore, China, and the Bahamas.

She has students who play in school and youth orchestras, and hold leadership positions with their orchestras; and she has adult students who

play with community orchestras, including our own Edgewood Symphony. She currently has an 8 year old student, taking online lessons, who has entered a competition the past 2 years, placing 3<sup>rd</sup> both times, and was able to perform at Carnegie Hall in New York City! They are preparing now for next year's competition.

When asked what she likes best about being in the neighborhood, she says, "I love getting to meet people in my community. It is wonderful to see all of my students improve and progress each year." We're glad to have Susanna as a part of our community!







In keeping with its annual tradition, the Edgewood Fire Department is pleased to make luminaria available to Borough residents. 
### **Edgewood Borough Police Department Addresses Gun Violence**

Since the tragic deaths of 11 worshipers DeAngelis for an evening of discussion at the Tree of Life Synagogue occurred a little over a year ago just a few miles from Edgewood, the police department has taken measures to address gun violence head on. This fall, Edgewood Police Officers and officers from 19 other departments around the Turtle Creek Valley are participating in a two-day active shooter training to ensure police officers from different municipalities can work together in a critical incident. "It's absolutely vital that neighboring departments interact with each other and train to the same level of preparedness so that we can effectively respond to these tragic events," said Edgewood Borough Police Chief Bob Payne. The training is being made possible through the Turtle Creek Valley Council of Governments and funding from State Senator Jay Costa.

In an effort to understand the some of the reasons that lead to mass shootings specifically in schools, The Edgewood Police Department and Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf recently partnered to host former Columbine High School Principal Frank

about bullying and societal factors that have contributed to the increase in violent attacks. Mr. DeAngelis addressed a crowd consisting of law enforcement, educators, and civilians about signs to watch out for in school-aged children and his thoughts on how to respond to this crisis. A special thanks to Officer Fred Livingston for arranging the event, State Senator Jay Costa and UPMC for funding and the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf for hosting. Proceeds from the \$10 ticket sales went to benefit the Western Pennsylvania Police Athletic League.

Lastly, Edgewood Borough Council and the Edgewood Police Department created the "Make the 2nd Count" gun safety campaign to remind all gun owners to be responsible gun owners. Some municipalities have tried to enact their own gun legislation which has gotten tied up in costly legal battles with no real effect on the problem. Make the 2<sup>nd</sup> Count is meant to hold gun owners accountable for their firearms through a few basic monthly safety checks.



On the **second** day of every month, gun owners are encouraged to:

- Verify the location of their gun(s);
- Confirm it is in a locked and secured
- See that it is unloaded;
- Check that the ammunition is stored separately in a locked and secured
- Know the keys for both the gun and ammunition are secured and out of reach of children.

At the least, checking every month provides a time frame for owners and law enforcement of the theft/loss. It may save the life of a family member or neighbor-more people are accidently shot by someone "just looking" at a family owned gun, or struggling with emotional issues. This also helps law enforcement track trends in types of theft and areas targeted in our community. Reporting a gun lost or stolen protects owners should their weapon be used in a crime and gives weight to the charges brought when a felon is found with a stolen weapon.

Gun ownership is a Right with responsibilities. Be a part of protecting our community. On the Second of every month, go through the check list. Keep your guns secured. NEVER LEAVE YOUR GUN IN YOUR CAR. And report any gun lost or stolen to Edgewood Police Department as soon as it is discovered missing. Make the Second Count stickers and post cards are available at the Borough Building. Your actions can help our police address gun violence.

### **Overnight Parking Rules**

As many of our residents and visitors are well aware, a parking permit is needed to park on a public roadway in Edgewood Borough between 3-5 a.m. We hope that most, if not all residents have already purchased a permit by now if they plan on parking on the street. A parking permit can be purchased at the Edgewood Borough building between 8 a.m. to midnight, Monday through Friday. The cost for a yearly, on street parking pass is \$20.00. A visitor pass can also be purchased for \$20.00. To purchase an on street parking permit, you must provide the vehicle registration, proof of insurance, as well as proof of residency.

Once you purchase a permit sticker, please adhere it to THE LOWER LEFT CORNER OF THE BACK WINDOW. The permit is to be placed on the OUTSIDE of the window so that it can be visible at night. Most sport utility vehicles are equipped with factory tinted rear windows. Our officers will NOT be able to see your permit if you place it on the inside of your window. This will result in you receiving a parking ticket. Officers check every vehicle in Edgewood Borough and you will receive a parking ticket if your permit is not in the correct location. Once an officer has written a parking ticket and walks up to your vehicle, it is too late if he/she notices a permit or visitors permit lying on the dashboard.

The visitor permit is made to hang on your rear view mirror. Officers understand that there is a small percentage of vehicles that this will not work on. Officers suggest utilizing a rubber band to temporarily attach it to the mirror so that it is visible. Once again, you will receive a parking ticket if the officer does not see a permit on your rear view mirror.

On the parking ticket, there is a box that can be checked that reads, "Prohibited truck parking midnight—6:00 A.M." This section refers to commercial vehicles, trailers, and similar equipment. No vehicle may be parked on an Edgewood Borough street that is used in the furtherance of a business. This would be vehicles that have advertising on them, ladder racks, tool boxes, etc. This section also applies to work trailers, recreational type trailers, boats, etc. These types of trailers are not permitted to be left on the roadways, or left overnight while still attached to the vehicle.




#### Tai Chi Fall Session

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# **Wu-style Tai Chi:** A grounding health practice and Martial Art

Some people may have seen the advertisements for Tai Chi classes hosted at the Koenig field house over the past year. In this brief article, I wanted to share what is covered in the classes as well as some background on Tai Chi practice and its benefits.


Wu-Style is simply one of the many styles of the art form. The other two most common are Yang and Chen. Wu-style uses more naturally spaced stances that don't require as much lower body flexibility and focuses on 100% weight shifting between feet while moving. The curriculum of the classes centers on the Wu-Style Tai Chi Essential Form, which is comprised of five core postures, and takes around 5 minutes to practice once learned, requiring very little space. We also cover basic standing postures that help build stability and strengthen the lower body. Forms are tools and are fundamental in Tai Chi practice. They also contain self-defense applications, but these aren't the direct purpose of learning them. By using the mind to direct our movements in a sequence, we retrain the body's natural movement to one that is more efficient, effectively building new habits. This, in turn, improves posture and mobility, as well as coordination, balance, and agility.

Being a health-oriented class, we also discuss underlying Tai Chi principles and philosophy and how they apply to wellness and mobility. Tai Chi uses slow, deliberate movements aimed at deepening the mind-body connection, while teaching the practitioner how to relax while moving as well as standing. Through practice of the standing postures and form, students gain subtle but profound insights into how they hold themselves upright, how much of their movement patterns are unconscious, where there is internal resistance or tension, and how to integrate their body to move as one piece. A common saying passed down from my teachers is that Tai Chi practice can improve whatever it is that you do. This is also why we increasingly see athletes practicing it as well as those just beginning a physical practice. My goal is to help people uncover a more thorough understanding of their mindbody connection through the art form and provide students with tangible tools they can take with them to improve their well-being.

Although using Tai Chi as a health-focused practice alone is very beneficial, it is also important to note that Tai Chi is a Martial Art, and all of its core principles derive from this purpose. Loosely translated, T'ai chi ch'üan or simply Tàijí quán, means 'Grand Ultimate Fist'. As a Martial Art, its goals have a long learning curve. It seeks to create full-body integration and have the greatest possible effect on an opponent, using the least amount of force. This feature in particular, makes it very flexible and efficient. Wu-Style, like the other styles of Tai Chi, also has longer forms, partner drills, and weapons training for those that wish to continue down that path.
