Council Meetings



Code Enforcement Reminders

Property owners in Edgewood are responsible for maintaining their sidewalks and curbs. Please take advantage of the summer weather to address any cracked, crumbling, or offset sidewalk sections and curbs. Please remember to keep your grass under 6 inches in height. Lastly, garbage cans are to be set out no earlier than 6 p.m. on the evening before collection and must be removed by 5 p.m. on the day of collection. All refuse must be placed in containers to avoid spillage and attracting rodents. Recyclables must be placed into a container and be free of plastic bags.



SPOTLIGHT ON LOCAL BUSINES

Regent Square Zumba

Te spoke with Andrea Eilenberger of Regent Square Zumba. Based out of Shaolin Studios, you may have seen the classes meeting over at Koenig Field. They have been a part of the community for over 13 years! In 2008, Krista Bremer and Erin Gilchrist were newly licensed Zumba instructors ready to establish a home for their classes and share their passion with friends and students. Not long after, they met Senior Master Steve Nakamura, owner of Steve De-Masco's Shaolin Studios on South Braddock Ave. They explained what Zumba is all about. He agreed to share his space—"and the rest is history!" Krista and Erin started out with just two classes each week. The team has since grown to five instructors who offer eight classes each week.

If you still aren't sure what Zumba is, it's a dance aerobic workout meant for everybody. Andrea described it as "an exercise in disguise." It features a variety of dance rhythms like salsa, bachata, merengue, hip hop and reggaeton. "We've got great music and encourage you to put your own style on the moves! Regent Square Zumba is about so much more than getting a great

workout! It's a place where you can work on your health, feel supported, be yourself without judgment, and join a strong community of people who want to have fun while they get fit." She noted that they often host fundraisers to dance and raise money for local charities.

For anyone wanting to test if out, they do offer the first class free. "You can expect a dance aerobic workout set to music that will get you moving. You may not get all the moves during your first class, but you'll sweat and burn lots of calories! The goal is to keep moving and have fun. As you learn the moves and become more comfortable, you can make the steps bigger, squat lower, and adjust your intensity level. There are modifications for each move, so you can get a solid workout based on your level."

She says that one of the best things about being an instructor is showing people that exercise can be fun. "Seeing people relax and shake off their stress for an hour is the best gift from the front of the room. The smiles say it all!"

Like many businesses, they had to make adjustments due to Covid. Many classes moved online and outdoor classes were added. Some classes still meet at the Koenig Field tennis court on Friday evenings and Sunday mornings when weather permits. The bulk of the classes are online and Andrea noted that this format allowed them to reconnect with prior participants who moved away, as well as meet new people from other areas world wide. This includes a class that was co-taught with an instructor in Mexico. They plan to continue offering livestreams of their in-person classes as long as they are able, and they look forward to returning to the studio in the next few weeks.

When asked what she likes best about being in Edgewood, Andrea responded that, "the best part about Edgewood is its neighborhood feel. People are quick to say hello and make you feel welcome. We've met so many kind and open-minded people from the square! We're loving that the warm weather has brought more people out and about. The activity at Koenig Field and on Braddock Avenue is exciting!"



Edgewood Recycles

Get the most out of your Hard To Recycle pick up

If you have electronic waste, batteries, light bulbs or household chemicals that are taking up precious space in your home, make use of Republic Services Hard-To-Recycle and E-Waste pickup services! There is no additional charge for these services.

The best way to schedule a pickup is to call Republic's local phone number, 800-464-2120. Most pickups will be scheduled within several weeks from the time you call. You may be required to put items in a special bag or tag it in a particular way. Be sure to keep your items indoors and only place them in the pickup area within 12 hours of pickup.

Hazardous Waste is different from e-waste, and the pickups are separate. Hazardous Waste includes batteries, light bulbs and chemicals. E-waste refers to any computer, television or electronic appliances. Pickups for these types of items will be separate. Hazardous Waste is typically picked up on Fridays, but you will be sent a kit prior to your pickup, so the pickup will be several days from when you make the call to schedule. E-Waste is picked up on a rotating basis.

Your hazardous waste and e-waste can now be safely collected from each home by calling 800-464-2120.

Look through your home for hazardous items that need discarding—everything from batteries and paint to computers and chemicals—and feel secure knowing Republic Services will handle these special items; protecting both you and the environment!

Residents who call will be asked to describe the items they want collected. They will be asked to use a special kit to collect the items, which will be delivered to them. Each kit includes a 42-gallon clear plastic bag and detailed instructions on how to safely package the items, along with a collection date. These items **MUST** be kept in a secure location; NOT at the curb, until collection. The only exception is a single item weighing 50 lbs. or more, such as a large TV, which must be placed at the curb.

On the collection day, Republic Services personnel will collect the specially packaged items and recycle them.

Here is a list of items that Republic Services will collect (5 gallons or less)

- Paint (latex and oil-based)
- Paint thinners
- Gasoline
- Solvents
- Oil
- Petroleum-based lubricants

- Ethylene
- Glycol
- Antifreeze
- Pesticides/herbicides
- Aerosols
- Mercury/mercury debris
- Light bulbs (fluorescents, compact fluorescents (CFL)
- High-intensity discharge (HID) lamps
- Batteries (lead acid, alkaline, NiCad)
- Pool chemicals/cleaners (acidic & basic)
- Resins and epoxy

Republic Services will NOT accept the following:

- Radioactive compounds
- · Smoke detectors
- Ammunition/explosives
- Tires
- Asbestos
- PCBs (Polychlorinated biphenyls)
- Pharmaceuticals/controlled substances
- Biological/infectious wastes
- Medical Sharps
- Fire Extinguishers
- Propane tank





BODY CAMERAS

All Edgewood police officers will be outfitted with body cameras this summer.

The Edgewood Police Department purchased 15 Motorola WatchGuard V300 body worn cameras in the beginning of 2021. The department developed a policy stipulating how and when the cameras are to be used. Officers will be trained on their operation and deployment and will be taught the use policy.

Each officer will be assigned their own camera to be worn during their respective shift. Each camera is specific to each officer and can be adjusted for things such as the officer's height or where they may be wearing it on their body. This ensures that the camera is always focused exactly where it needs to be.

The body worn camera has a 12-hour battery life and all videos are backed up to a secured server at the end of every shift. The department's policy states that an officer will immediately turn the camera on once dispatched to a 911 call or when interacting with the public. Activation only requires the officer pressing a large button on the front of the camera. The camera will remain in the record mode until manually turned off by the officer. Turning the camera off requires a series of actions to prevent accidental shutdown.

The Edgewood Police Department is very pleased to have body worn cameras to ensure the safety of the officers who wear them and the public they protect.

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Memorial Park Gazebo Installation Update

Over the past several months local veterans, countless community members, graduates of Edgewood and Boy Scouts have teamed up fundraising for this project. Through the combined efforts they raised the funds to provide a sheltered place for the community to sit, reflect and appreciate the park and memorial.

A group of scouts, veterans and volunteers pitched in by preparing the ground in Memorial Park. The sunshine kept everyone company while lots of hard work was accomplished. In between the spring rain drops, Santamaria Landscape & Cement, Inc. poured truckloads of gravel into the freshly dug hole and later returned to pour the concrete floor. The long awaited gazebo pieces arrived on a palate on Friday, May 14 and construction plans started taking shape.

The following weekend the post anchors were put in place after volunteers carefully measured, then measured again, and one more

time for good measure! Many

smiling faces equipped with their power tools and eagerness to help joined Edward Lockman to help construct the long awaited gazebo. The breeze and sunshine made for a terrific day as the structure came together!

Scouts and volunteers also helped create a mulch walkway from the sidewalk on Swissvale Avenue to the sidewalk on the opposite side of the park, with a path to the gazebo.

In addition to the gazebo, ornamental bricks engraved with the names of donors will be placed around the base of the flag pole. More bricks can be added to this area in the future.






Weekly Zoom Meetings Continue

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Tree Planting in the Woodland Hills School District

4th Grade Students Enjoy Inaugural Tree Planting Event at Wilkins Elementary STEAM Academy

Forty energetic 4th grade students had a rewarding chance to plant 20 new trees in the back of Wilkins Elementary STEAM Academy on April 15, 2021. Clara Kitongo, *One Tree Per Child* Pittsburgh Program Coordinator at *Tree Pittsburgh* and Isabela Angelelli, M.D. of UPMC Children's Hospital and cofounder of *Tree Pittsburgh's One Tree Per Child* Program, led the event. Upon arrival, students were given attractive T-shirts and work gloves to keep. They moved to an open field to do some physical exercises and learn about the benefits of trees. The students then gathered around *Tree Pittsburgh* Director of Tree Care and Reforestation Jake Milofsky to learn how to safely handle a shovel and to plant a new tree. The students were finally each given a shovel and paired to plant trees with oversight by their teachers, some Woodland Hills School District officials, and a few other invited guests. There were many smiles throughout the morning for the two 4th grade classes taking part in the event, which is an attempt to begin reversal of an adverse trend underway throughout the school district.

Using satellite images, a *Tree Pittsburgh* study found the 12 municipalities comprising the Woodland Hills School District lost 235 acres of tree canopy, equivalent to 178 football fields, in just five short years from 2010 to 2015. Most of the canopy loss is due to tree removal for development, infrastructure clearance, and individual removal of trees on residential properties. Tree removal has continued within the district since 2015 with updated satellite images expected for review in 2022. Tree canopy reflects the health and well-being of communities by impacting issues, such as air quality, stormwater runoff, and removal of CO_2 that influences climate change concerns. Given this situation, the Woodland Hills School District has initiated tree planting and preservation efforts to reverse this unfavorable development.

Tree Pittsburgh, an environmental non-profit organization dedicated to restoring and protecting healthy urban forests, has obtained a grant from the Allegheny County Health Department to plant 1,200 trees in five school districts, including Woodland Hills, to address air quality concerns in affected communities. New tree plantings done via Tree Pittsburgh's One Tree Per Child Program engages students, teachers, parents, principals & staff. 200 new trees are designated for Woodland Hills school sites. In parallel, Woodland Hills passed a resolution in 2019 for a student-led Climate Initiative to develop and implement actions to address climate related issues. The school district's climate action efforts are currently recruiting teachers, students, and staff to carry out tree planting and other related initiatives.

For example, a Tree Adoption Event was also held at the Woodland Hills Senior High School on Earth Day, April 22, 2021. Nearly 200 new trees were provided for free to teachers, staff and residents throughout the school district who had registered for the event. *Tree Pittsburgh's* Volunteer and Special Events Coordinator Erin Gaughan was the key lead and partner for this successful activity.

Future tree planting and tree adoption events are expected for Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 across the five Woodland Hills school sites. Funds however are being sought to obtain and plant more than 100 larger landscape trees at our schools located in Churchill, Edgewood, Swissvale, Turtle Creek and Wilkins Township to supplement trees kindly provided by *Tree Pittsburgh*.
