Board vacancies

Volunteers are needed to fill vacancies on the borough's Planning Commission and Vacancy Board. There are currently two vacancies on Planning Commission and one individual is needed on the Vacancy Board. The role of a planning commission member during a four-year term is to serve as an advisor to borough council on matters of land use, community development and planning. The role of a vacancy board member is to work with council to fill vacancies in elected offices like council or tax collection. Any registered elector of the borough can be appointed by council to a two-year term on the Vacancy Board.

Individuals interested in being considered for any of these positions should submit a letter of interest highlighting their background and experience ASAP to manager@edgewoodboro.com or by mail to 2 Race Street Pittsburgh PA 15218. Letters will be reviewed by borough council who is tasked with making the appointments.

Reminders about tree maintenance and responsibility

Please take a moment to familiarize

vourself with the rules surrounding borough street trees. A street tree is defined as any tree on the land lying between the sidewalk and the street. Street trees are owned and maintained by the borough. Any other tree is considered a private tree and is the responsibility of the property owner whose property the tree is situated on. Only fallen limbs from street trees will be collected by the public works department. Please call 412-242-4824 option #4 and leave a message with your address and an employee will collect the fallen limb.

2021 Road Paving Program

Borough Council authorized a \$375,407 contract with A. Liberoni for road paving and reconstruction of the following streets:

- Boyd Alley from Monongahela Alley to Greendale Avenue
- Greendale Avenue from house # 534 to Race Street
- Gordon Street from Westmoreland Avenue to Edgewood Avenue
- Maple Avenue & Edgewood/Swissvale Avenue intersection
- McKay Street from Race Street to house # 114.
- Pennwood Avenue from Washington Street to Wilkinsburg border
- Pliney Way from Sanders Street to Wilkinsburg border

The program includes catch basin repairs and drainage improvements where necessary and the installation of new ADA compliant sidewalk ramps at all intersections. Curb repairs are performed only in conjunction with ramp

installation, deficiencies located outside of the ramp are the responsibility of the property owner.

Grants

The borough was recently awarded a \$230,144 grant from PennDOT to update the traffic signal at Race Street and Pennwood. The project will include new traffic and pedestrian signal installation, new traffic controller with battery backup, and an advance signal on the eastern side of the Race Street tunnel to improve line of sight issues for motorists and cyclists. Construction will start in 2022.

The borough received \$28,018 for the installation of several ADA pedestrian sidewalk ramps on Walnut Street, Hawthorne Street, and W. Swissvale Avenue. The funds were awarded to the borough under the Community Development Block Grant program. Construction will be completed in 2022.

Rescue and Relax

re you a cat person or a dog person? Whatever your preference we know that many of our neighbors are pet people. Coming soon to 117 Edge-Wood Avenue, Rescue and Relax is a new space to hang out with some four-legged friends. We spoke with Alysia Finger, an Edgewood resident since 2014, to find out more.

We learned that although the storefront is a new addition, the organization started as a neighborhood cat rescue project using the name 'Kitty HydeAway'. It started towards the beginning of the pandemic when Ms. Finger's sister found a kitten in some bushes. They went to check on the kitten and discovered an alley full of cats. After speaking with the neighbors, they learned that the cats were being fed but not fixed. The pair put up flyers and advertised via social media to raise money to get the cats spayed/neutered. Inspired by the community support, they continued to find homes for friendly cats (adopting some themselves). She said that in the past year and a half they rescued over 300 cats!

"The new lounge space will allow people to meet adoptable kitties and volunteer so that we can continue to expand our rescue efforts and help even more homeless animals. Starting the business up in Edgewood makes sense because it

connects the communities we've been working in and that have supported us as we learned the ins and outs of cat rescue." They are planning to have refreshments, books, and pet-themed items and activities at the lounge; but everything will be donation-based rather than for sale. "The goal is to help the cats, not make money. Having people come socialize with the cats is a huge help because many of them have gone without human affection for quite a while; and getting some attention will help them relax and warm up to people again as they wait to find their forever homes." All of the rescued cats in the lounge will be adoptable, spayed/neutered, vaccinated, and have received any necessary medical care. The space should be opening with regular hours by mid-August. They will advertise their official opening at the storefront and on their social media. In the meantime, adoption meet-and-greets are available by appointment by emailing rescuerelax@gmail.com.

Ms. Finger is excited to share rescue success stories that can inspire others to help, such as a situation where she and a resident rescued kittens from an abandoned property. The building had burned, and the kittens were nick-named "the Soots." The resident fostered the feline family and continues to foster now. "Our long-term goal is to help as many cats and other abandoned animals as we can. Our hope is that having a physical location will help spread awareness to the community about the important work that small, independent rescuers like ourselves do throughout Pittsburgh. Rescue and Relax will be a more accessible way for the larger community to support rescue work financially and through volunteering."

We asked Ms. Finger what she likes best about being in the neighborhood. She responded that, "I've enjoyed being a part of this community and

meeting residents both old and new. I like that everything across Pittsburgh feels very accessible from Edgewood, and I still have the benefit of having approachable, friendly neighbors. I'm happy to bring a new business to the area and hope to see more follow that can create unique experiences for residents to enjoy."



Upstream Pittsburgh (formerly Nine Mile Run Watershed Association) has partnered with Edgewood Borough throughout the past 20 years on projects like neighborhood cleanups, tree plantings, and forming the Shade Tree Committee. We are proud of those accomplishments, and we are excited to showcase our newest project with the Borough, a stormwater tree trench along Maple Avenue. This green stormwater infrastructure (GSI) facility was recently completed in late June as part of an ongoing effort to build more nature-based-solutions throughout the Nine Mile Run Watershed.

This site included the retrofit of over 70 linear feet of sidewalk and the street tree planting strip. C&R Landscape Development was the contractor on the project, and was able to transform this site in under two weeks. They excavated down three feet to remove the existing clay soils, backfilled with new structural soils, poured new sidewalks, installed stone check dams, and




Figure 1: Graph from Ethos Collaborative showing performance metrics for the Maple Ave tree pits.

UpstreamPgh is currently working with Ethos Collaborative, CivicMapper, and CEC to establish monitoring equipment in the near future. This equipment will quantify gallons captured and therefore removed from the sewer system in real-time. They plan to have monitoring equipment installed at all of their GSI projects by March of 2022 which will include a web based dashboard for residents and community members to view and interpret the data. We will share updates with Edgewood when the dashboard is ready for viewing.



finally Upstream's staff planted a mix of native plants and trees.

UpstreamPgh received funding to construct GSI from the Richard King Mellon Foundation, and approached the Borough in 2020 with the idea of placing a stormwater facility along Maple Ave in the space where a few trees were removed. This was an ideal location because the street is wide and on a slope, so there is a good deal of water that accumulates when it rains. The project engineers, Ethos Collaborative, calculate that there is over 600,000 gallons of rain that flows by this intersection every year (see graph for details). The GSI facility is designed to capture over 137,000 gallons of water annually.


All school zones are clearly posted and have a 15 mile per hour speed limit. If you choose to exceed this speed limit, you will be subject to greater fines and penalties.
