From The Manager's Desk

2023 Parking Permits— Resident on-street and visitor on-street parking permits go on sale Thursday December 1, 2022. Permits can be purchased online at http://www.edgewood.pgh.pa.us/edgewood-parkingpermits. Permits will be mailed to purchasers thereby eliminating the need to appear in person to buy a permit at the borough building. On-street resident and visitor permits cost \$35 each. Off-street borough parking lot permits cost \$100. Recreational vehicle parking at the borough building will be discontinued in 2023 due to space constraints in the parking lot.

Permits for the Ivy Street, Laurel Street, Oakview Avenue, and Willow Place off-street parking lots will be made available for purchase based upon requests starting on Monday December 12, 2022. Residents interested in purchasing an off-street lot permit should submit their completed permit application to the borough on or before Monday December 12, 2022. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit for a lot until all initial requests are processed.

Intersection Improvements— Motorists have likely noticed the changes made to the Race Street and East Swissvale Avenue intersection at the end of November. These changes were made as part of an ARLE (Automated Red Light Enforcement) Grant from PennDOT and are intended to increase pedestrian and vehicular safety at a very busy intersection. The redesign went through several reviews by the borough's Public Safety Committee and Borough Council over the course of roughly 20 months before being approved for construction. The delineator bulb outs are meant to narrow the intersection approaches thereby increasing compliance with the posted STOP signs and reducing vehicle speed. Removing the 'except right turn' priority for vehicles turning right from Race Street onto East Swissvale Avenue eliminated a sight line conflict with vehicles coming from the direction of Wilkinsburg on E. Swissvale Avenue. Adjustments to signage and paint markings will be made over the winter and spring as needed based on field observations.

Snow Maps— Over the winter, the borough will be partnering with an individual to take aerial photographs of the borough after a snow fall to show which homes <u>may</u> be losing heat through uninsulated or underinsulated attics. Generally, rapid snow melt from a roof after a snow fall indicates heated air is escaping the living quarters of a home and entering the unoccupied attic. The heated air raises the temperature of the attic to a point above freezing and the snow melts. This can drive up home heating costs and contribute to premature roof failure, attic mold growth and destructive ice damming. Adding insulation greatly reduces heat loss into attic spaces and can earn homeowners a tax credit in 2023 once the IRS rules are finalized early next year.



Additional information on how to access the maps will be made available in a later issue since this mapping project requires both snowfall and an appreciable amount of time to complete. The borough does not require, track, monitor or maintain any information on the energy performance of any dwelling.

Koenig Tennis Courts— Due to unfavorable weather conditions, the resurfacing of the tennis courts has been pushed to early spring of 2023. Your patience is appreciated and work will be completed as soon as possible.

Ordinance Updates— Edgewood Borough Council will adopt two ordinances aimed at bolstering public safety at its December 5, 2022 meeting. The first is an ordinance requiring key lock boxes be installed on all multifamily dwellings, commercial establishments, educational facilities and governmental structures be installed within six months of its adoption. This will better enable First Responders to easily and quickly gain access in the event of an emergency without having to knock down a door or doors resulting in costly repairs borne by the property owner.

The second ordinance regulates residential rental unit occupancy, registration and triennial health and safety inspections. The intent of this ordinance is to gather and maintain an accurate list of all rental properties in the borough and to make sure that each unit meets basic health and safety living standards. This includes items like carbon monoxide and smoke detectors, functioning alarm systems, exit signs, fire doors, GFCI outlets, and an inspected electrical panel. All rental property owners will have ninety days to comply with the terms of the ordinance upon adoption.

Carey Palenchar Photography

ne thing (amongst many) that we have learned over the past few years, is that not every job takes place in an office, and not every local business is found in a brick-and-mortar storefront. She specializes in children and family portrait photography. "I like to blend classic, posed images with more casual, lifestyle images

that show connection between family members. I keep my sessions relaxed and playful. I don't want my clients to miss out on a single moment, so my packages are all inclusive. Families receive all of their digital images. I also love creating beautiful, custom albums for the families I photograph." Since the business was started during the Covid pandemic, sessions were exclusively outdoors to start. She now includes lifestyle sessions inside client's homes.

In addition to family photography, Ms. Palenchar is the current photographer for Edgewood youth sports teams, including t-ball, soccer, and basketball. She also did a costume photo booth for Edgewood Cub Scout Pack 23, of which she is the Cubmaster.

Ms. Palenchar, who moved from St. Louis to Pittsburgh in 2008, and then to Edgewood in 2010, resides in the neighborhood with her husband, and sons, Henry and Sam. When asked about her favorite part of being in the community, she responded, "I love all of the amazing kids that live in our neighborhood and seeing their familiar faces at community events, sports games, Cub Scouts, Koenig Field, and the library. I also love walking in the neighborhood and admiring all of the beautiful houses and yards. At the first sign of spring, I have a ritual of walking around Edgewood with my camera and photographing flowers pushing their way through the snow."

A Season of Giving

For the past several years, FPCE has partnered with Mars Home for Youth when collecting donations for the annual Manger Tree drive. MHY FamilyServices is a non-profit organization serving youth with intensive behavioral needs and social challenges, and providing them a safe environment on their journey to wellness. Each year, MHY supports over 300 children through our residential program, and over 1,000 boys, girls and families in our community through our specialized traumabased treatment. In our own backyard, FPCE also supports the efforts of Wilkinsburg Community Ministry in their food distribution programs. WCM provides services to approximately 5,000 residents per year, including senior citizens, citizens with disabilities, at-risk youth, and families who are economically challenged, or facing emergency situations. The unity of several congregations makes it possible for WCM to meet the extreme needs and provide effective community services to all persons regardless of race, religion, gender, sexual orientation and creed. Christmas Tree Recycling

Tree recycling normally takes place at all nine park locations (Boyce, Deer Lakes, Harrison Hills, Hartwood Acres, Round Hill, Settlers Cabin, White Oak, and North and South Parks). Trees are recycled and turned into mulch to be used at the parks. All lights, decorations, tinsel, and stands must be removed from trees prior to drop-off.

String Light Recycling

Not sure what to do with those broken, or no longer needed strings of lights after the holidays? There are several ways to get rid of them responsibly. If lights are still in good working condition, you can pass them along to a friend or neighbor; or use a local community social media group or website (ie, Facebook community groups, or your local Buy Nothing group). You can also check area thrift stores to see if they are accepting used but working lights and decorations. Many hardware stores have programs to recycle non-working lights (please consult your local hardware stores to see if they are participating, and for details), and there are several websites where you can mail your broken or unwanted lights. Some may even offer a discount on a future purchase. You can also check with your local waste management company to inquire about recycling options. Finally, if you are feeling creative, you could try to repurpose them (if just a few bulbs are out, you could add them to a jar display for instance).

For more than 150 years, the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf has a tradition of innovation and ingenuity as the school seeks to position itself as the premier center for the education and empowerment of Deaf and Hard of Hearing students in western Pennsylvania and beyond. Guided by the school's Master Plan, WPSD has embarked on a significant investment to ensure the safety of students, improve the community, and enhance the beauty of the campus.

Beginning next summer, the school will begin to execute another installment of this investment on campus to benefit its students. This exciting project will become an extension of the current Children's Center and will be geared toward recreation, socialization and education of our littlest learners. The project involves removing an asphalt parking area in order to relocate our Children's Village and introduce a new recreation space, accessible to all students. Simply stated, the project is designed to create new opportunities for our young students to run, play and grow during the school day.

Established on the campus in 2007, the Children's Village has been a popular destination on campus. It is a place where students from the Children's Center can play and learn as they walk down main street and enjoy any one of the many buildings there. Teachers have implemented a curriculum that uses each building as a teaching destination with specific goals for preschool, kindergarten, first grade and second grade classes.

Relocating the Village to the front of the Children's Center benefits both students and staff. Our students will continue to enjoy a fully-accessible recreation space that offers new socialization opportunities involving play, adventure and making friends. For staff, the configuration allows for easier supervision and monitoring of children. It also improves student and staff safety by eliminating the need to move students along a route that is also used by a variety of vehicles.

While preserving the Children's Village, the project would offer two new exciting opportunities for the school's little learners.






Woodland Hills School District

Approximately 80 students from multiple districts gathered at Woodland Hills High School on Tuesday, November 8 to begin preparation and planning for the annual Woodland Hills Student Summit in the spring. Now in its fourth year, the summit continues to grow and incorporate more schools and students. The planning session was the latest expansion to the Student Summit from organizer Ms. Erin Wall, an English teacher at Woodland Hills High School. It featured presentations from experts on effective leadership, the keys to differentiating empathy from sympathy, the characteristics of robust equity, and tips to navigate group dynamics.
